For over 170 years, Marygrove has been a place where children, youth, and families in need have found hope and healing. Marygrove provides treatment and support to young people struggling with physical, sexual and emotional abuse, neglect, abandonment, and other trauma. As one of the only organizations in the St. Louis metro area to provide a comprehensive continuum of residential and community-based programs, Marygrove transforms nearly 1,000 young lives each year.

On-campus private special education school for children who struggle to learn in a traditional classroom.

FOSTER CARE

Provides support to youth with emotional and behavioral issues in a family setting that encourages healthy growth and development.

Days of Care in FY: 7,470


CRISIS CARE



MARYGROVE MISSION MOMENTS

Jackson and his brother, Gavin, arrived at Marygrove with only the clothes they wore and broken hearts after being removed from their home because of their mother's substance abuse. They spent much of their childhood homeless, living in their family van, tents, and bouncing around to various family members' homes. When the boys first arrived, they struggled with social skills, aggressive behavior, and most of all, a lack of trust for adults. After nearly three years of family therapy and support, Jackson, Gavin, and their mother began to move beyond their past struggles and toward a promising future for them all. Last March, we proudly witnessed two brothers reuniting with their mother permanently. While leaving Marygrove with her children, Mom joyfully cried, *"our wolfpack is finally back together again."*

Jessica struggled with homelessness since the age of 15 after finding her mother unresponsive due to a drug overdose. After her mother's death, she began living with various family members who also struggled with substance abuse and financial stability. When Jessica received a referral from her high school counselor, she joined Marygrove's Independent Living Program and not only managed to graduate high school early but also while working a full-time job where she's training to become a manager. Jessica currently attends a local community college with plans to pursue a career as a Forensic Science Technician. Jessica expresses her gratitude for Marygrove stating, *"Marygrove has given me the life skills I need to learn how to become an independent adult. For those of you struggling, never give up hope no matter how hard it gets - you will come out stronger in the end."*



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
